Friday and Saturday, June 15 and 16, 22 and 23, 29 and 30, 2018

5 p.m. doors open. 6 p.m. performance begins. \$55 per person includes pupu and 2 complimentary drink tickets, with cash bar thereafter\* and followed by a "talk back" session with the actors and researcher. Presented at O'ahu Cemetery, 2162 Nu'uuanu Avenue.

This production highlights civil servants from the history of Hawai'i. Alexander J. Cartwright was a leading figure in early modern baseball in New York State but wound up serving as the Honolulu Fire Chief. Curtis Piehu Iaukea born on the Island of Hawai'i, served the Kingdom, Provisional Government, the Republic, and the Territory. Lucy Kaopaulu Peabody was a lady in waiting to Queen Emma and rechartered the Queen Ka'ahumanu Society in 1905. Originally from New Hampshire, William Cooper Parke was appointed the Marshal of the Kingdom of Hawai'i and chief law enforcement officer during the 1853 smallpox epidemic. Mabel Leilani Smyth was the first Native Hawaiian public health nurse and is referred to as "Hawai'i's Florence Nightingale."



Hawaiian Mission Houses Historic Site and Archives is located at 553 South King Street, across from Honolulu Hale near Kawaiaha'o Church. **About Us**

Hawaiian Mission Houses Historic Site and Archives is located in Honolulu's Historic Capital District and is the leading authority on Protestant missionary history in Hawai'i. It is known worldwide as the place where the Hawaiian written language was developed through the collaborative efforts of the missionaries, the Hawaiian royalty, and the Hawaiian people. It preserves the two oldest existing houses in Hawai'i, which were built and used by missionaries in the early nineteenth century, and the largest collection of Hawaiian language books in the world.

**Our Vision**

Hawaiian Mission Houses Historic Site and Archives enriches our community by fostering thoughtful dialogue and greater understanding of the missionary role and impact on the history of Hawai'i.

**Main Theme**

Collaboration between Native Hawaiians and the American Protestant missionaries resulted in, among other things, the introduction of Christianity, the development of a written Hawaiian language and establishment of schools that resulted in widespread literacy, the promulgation of the concept of constitutional government, the combination of Hawaiian with Western medicine, and the evolution of a new and distinctive musical tradition with harmony and choral singing.

If you have visited our site before, come again to experience the Dr. Judd Dispensary and the Levi Chamberlain Depository in the 1821 Mission House cellar and the Domestic Arts Room upstairs. Don't miss the completely restored Print Shop, as well. The Archives of the Hawaiian Mission Children's Society are essential for anyone studying the history of Hawai'i. Primary source materials, such as letters, newspapers, and journals comprise rich sources to gain insight into this formative part of Hawaiian history. Many resources are now online and accessible digitally around the world.

The latest addition of materials to the Digital Collection are over 9,000 photographs of people and places in nineteenth-century Hawai'i. Letters from the Ali'i, about 230 letters written by more than 42 Hawaiian chiefs between 1820 and 1907, are now transcribed and translated for your use. We also have completed digitization of the Missionary Letters Collection, 1820 – 1900, including more than 74,000 pages of personal and business letters. **Daily Programs, Digital Archives, and Bicentennial Plans**



Commemoration of the Bicentennial of the arrival of the first missionaries to this site in 1820 begins this year on February 17 with a celebration of the life of 'Ōpūkaha'ia, a young Hawaiian who inspired the ABCFM to send missionaries to his people. Joint events at Hawaiian Mission Houses, Hilo, and Connecticut will mark his death in 1818.
